I. INTRODUCTION

By connecting people with wildlife, the Philadelphia Zoo creates joyful discovery and inspires action for animals and habitats.

The Zoo's vision for our campus is to create an animal and people experience like no other in the world. The Zoo affects how more than 1 million people a year appreciate and respect the natural world and over the next few years the Zoo and its partners will reshape how people experience zoos for generations to come.

This RFP is seeking proposals to evaluate a new program launching this Spring – the West Philadelphia Zoo Scholars (WPZS), a new education and career initiative for young people in the Zoo's shared community. This program will represent a long-term commitment to ensuring that children who grow up in West Philadelphia can do so at Philadelphia Zoo and lead them to a career in the zoological sciences.

In building this program, the Zoo will look to enrich the educational experience of families in West Philadelphia, close the education gap on STEM-based education, and diversify the field of candidates for careers in zoological sciences both locally and around the country.

The Zoo's immediate neighborhoods—Mantua, Belmont, Parkside and Brewerytown – are among the most challenged by socio-economic conditions. Poverty in Philadelphia remains among the highest of major U.S. cities at 26 percent—but in our surrounding communities, the poverty rate is a staggering 45%. Our children face extraordinary barriers to student and career success. The 13 area elementary schools near the Zoo have a very limited science curriculum and perform well below the average science proficiency standards for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. As they get older, these schools are unable to provide the "real-world" experiences and instruction that build the critical thinking skills foundational to college and career readiness. Frequently, this results in a disconnect from fields of study such as STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics), that lock them out of opportunities to cultivate a range of academic interests. One Pew Research study quotes that only 2.7% of African Americans and 2.2% Hispanic 24-year-olds have a STEM degree. Incidentally, these are the degrees that are required for a job as a zookeeper. Philadelphia Zoo is looking to shift that paradigm.

WPZS is a pilot program seeking to engage local high school students in an innovative and immersive educational experience. WPZS will be designed to serve as a model for education, community engagement, and career development at an urban zoo. As part of the Zoo's strategy to engage all Philadelphia students in lifelong learning that begins prior to grade school with a family visit, the new program serves high school-age students and provides multiple years of support to promote careers in the zoological sciences.

II. PROJECT GOALS

The goals of this project are to create and implement an evaluation plan that will track the objectives, progress, areas of opportunity for growth and overall story of the West Philadelphia Zoo Scholars program.

Program Objectives:

Objective: WPZS establishes a clear pathway for a student from West Philadelphia to pursue a career in the zoological sciences.

Objective: Expand the knowledge and skills of participants in WPZS to prepare for careers in the zoological sciences, including veterinary medicine, zookeeping and wildlife conservation.

Objective: Demonstrate a positive shift in attitude toward wildlife and the environment through immersive experiences in WPZS.

Objective: Increase frequency and exposure to the benefits of nature with participants families visting the zoo.

Objective: Demonstrate how an urban zoo can engage diverse and under-represented communities in STEM-related careers by directly addressing the social, financial and additional barriers to entry and inclusion.

In addition to the objectives above the Zoo would also like to include data collection and evaluation of these activites associated with the program objectives:

- Benefits of mentoring among Zookeepers and zoo staff with program participants
- Quality of life benefits on the participant students and their families as a result of Zoo experiences
- Long-term career trajectory of program participants
- Program impact on local conservation efforts specific to urban spaces

III. PROJECT SCOPE AND SERVICES

Awardees of this RFP will be expected to provide the following services and meet the following expectations:

1. Awardee will collaborate with the Zoo to create a detailed evaluation plan for the West Philadelphia Zoo Scholars program.

The detailed work plan will include strategies such as front-end, formative and summative evaluation methodologies for collecting, tracking and analyzing qualitative and quantitative data for each of the program objectives outlined in this RFP. The Zoo will defer to the awardees professional experience and recommendations to include but not limited to the following methods: focus groups, surveys, observations, record collection, etc.

Awardee will set clear methods and expectations for short and long term data collection based on their profesional experience, knowledge of requirements of data collection, storing and managing data with consideration of involvement of students, minors and sensitive stakeholders.

- 2. Awardee will purchase their own supplies and manage the expenses requested in the budget agreed upon with the Zoo.
- 3. Awardee will commit to a regular cadence of communication via email, in person and virtual meetings throughout the duration of the project timeline.
- 4. Awardee will share all data collected in relation to this evaluation with the Philadelphia Zoo on a regular cadence agreed upon in the project timeline.

IV. PROJECT BUDGET

Awardee may request a budget to the amount of \$125,000 over a three-year period to execute their proposed evaluation plan. This amount will be paid out in agreed upon installments over the course of three years and may include the following:

- Staffing
 - o If additional staffing is required to provide activities a fair wage may be requested
- Supplies (for continued use)
 - Any supplies that will be used to provide activity and used for the duration of the contract
- Incentives
 - Monetary or other suggested incentives for participation in focus groups, surveys or otherwise
- Data collection tools
 - o Software, equipment or other needs for collecting and storing data
- Travel and meals
 - To be provided for staff when travel and meals are required to achieve data collection as a part of the evaluation plan
- Other / Misc. Costs
 - o Additional costs requested by awardee to accomplish the evaluation plan

V. PROPOSAL CONTENT REQUIREMENTS

Proposals must contain the following:

- **1. Executive Summary** includes a cover letter describing the organization or person applying and a brief description of mission alignment with this RFP and services that will be provided. Also include mention of relation to West Philadelphia neighborhood. Must include a primary contact person, address, e-mail and telephone number.
- **2. Description of Activities** for carrying out the Scope of Services. This section of the proposal should describe the way the organization or person applying will provide the scope of services requested in this RFP. Visuals may be included as necessary. This description of activities should be as detailed as possible but not to exceed 750 words.
- **3. Schedule** Proposed schedule/durations of activities required for scope completion to be selected from the various schedules proposed.
- **4.** Proposed Budget for the scope of work utilizing the categories of allowable expenses detailed in this RFP.
- **5. Certificate of Insurance** indicating coverage consistent with requirements. (Refer back to RFP website for a link to details regarding Insurance expectations)
- **6. Professional Services Agreement Signed** (To be completed and collected to any vendor selected, a sample of the agreement is included below)

VI. ADDITIONAL PROPOSAL INFORMATION AND REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Selection Process The Zoo will evaluate all submissions for completeness and compliance with the terms and conditions of the RFP. A Selection Committee, consisting of representatives from the Zoo, along with other individuals deemed necessary, will review qualifications of submittals and evaluate the respondents, based on the following criteria:
- Relation/relevance to West Philadelphia neighborhood.
- Past performance on similar projects.
- Qualifications and experience to execute proposed activities.
- Alignment with the Zoo's mission and West Philadelphia Zoo Scholars objectives.
- Reasonable and fair budget to execute activities to fullest potential.

The Vendor is expressly free to perform services for other parties while performing services for the Zoo.

• Right to Injunction: The parties hereto acknowledge that the services to be rendered by the Vendor under this Agreement and the rights and privileges granted to the Zoo under the Agreement are of a special, unique, unusual and extraordinary character which gives them a peculiar value, the loss of which cannot be reasonably or adequately compensated by damages in any action at law, and the breach by the Vendor of any of the provisions of this Agreement will call the Zoo irreparable injury and damage.

The Vendor expressly agrees that the Zoo shall be entitled to injunctive and other equitable relief in the event of, or to prevent, a breach of any provision of this Agreement by the Vendor.

Resort to such equitable relief, however, shall not be construed to be a waiver of any other rights or remedies that the zoo may have for damages or otherwise.

The various rights and remedies of the Zoo under this Agreement or otherwise shall be construed to be cumulative, and no one of them shall be exclusive of any other or of any right or remedy allowed by law.

- Merger: The merger or consolidation of the Zoo into or with any other entity shall not terminate this Agreement.
- No Joint Venture: This Agreement shall not render the Vendor an employee, partner, agent of, or joint venture partner with the Zoo for any purpose. The Vendor is and will remain an independent Vendor in his/her/their relationship to the Zoo. The Zoo shall not be responsible for withholding taxes with respect to the Vendor's compensation hereunder. The Vendor shall have no claim again the Zoo hereunder or otherwise for vacation pay, sick leave, retirement benefits, social security, worker's compensation, health or disability benefits, unemployment insurance benefits, or employee benefits of any kind.
- <u>Choice of Law:</u> The laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania shall govern the validity of this Agreement, the construction of its terms, and the interpretation of the rights and duties of the parties hereto.
- <u>Arbitration:</u> Any controversies arising out of the terms of this Agreement or its
 interpretation shall be settled in Pennsylvania in accordance with the rules of the American
 Arbitration Association, and the judgment upon award may be entered in any court having
 jurisdiction thereof.
- <u>Headings:</u> Section headings are not to be considered a part of this Agreement and are not intended to be a full and accurate description of the contents hereof.
- <u>Waiver:</u> Waiver by one party hereto of breach of any provision of this Agreement by the other shall not operate or be construed as a continuing waiver.

- <u>Assignment:</u> The Vendor shall not assign any of his/her/their rights under this Agreement, or delegate the performance of any of his/her/their duties hereunder, without the prior written consent of the Zoo.
- Notices: Any and all notices, demands or other communications required or desired to be given hereunder by any party shall be in writing and shall be validly given or made to another party if personally served or if deposited in the United States mail. If such notice or demand is served personally, notice shall be deemed constructively made at the time of such personal service. If such notice, demand, or other communication is given by mail, such notice shall be conclusively deemed give five days after deposit thereof in the United States mail addressed to the party to whom such notice, demand, or other communication is given as follows:

- Entire Understanding: This document shall constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the parties, and any and all prior agreements, understandings, and representations are hereby terminated and canceled in their entirety and are of no further force and effect.
- <u>Unenforceability of Provisions</u>: If any provision of this Agreement, or any portion thereof, is held to be invalid and unenforceable, then the remainder of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect.
